OFFICER REPORTS

Governor's Report

Steve Kennedy, Carleton College

I represented the Section for my last Governors' meeting in San Diego in January. As always, the agenda was jam-packed. The financial situation of the Association remains a matter of serious concern. We have run deficits for each of the past eight years totaling over \$1,000,000 for those years. This was the major topic of conversation during the all-day meeting. Recall, from my last report, that at our last meeting the Board approved the principle of investing heavily this year in activities that have the potential to generate more revenue in the future. At this meeting we approved the budget for this year that included much of that investment. There are five targeted areas:

1. After many years of contracting with an outside provider for fulfillment (of membership, book orders, etc.) we will bring that back in-house. It is hoped that this will result in six-figure savings realized in a year or two.
2. The MAA website is undergoing a major renovation and redesign, it is expected that this will result in some efficiencies.
3. We received the final report of the Strategic Planning Working Group on Books and it made several suggestions for investments that could generate more revenue. MAA books are not marketed effectively to non-members, with some investment there is hope that sales will be generated. Also, MAA Textbooks are generally excellent and a serious bargain (compared to commercial options) but could be more widely adopted.
4. The MAA will hire additional Development staff to attempt to increase fundraising, especially in conjunction with the upcoming Centennial celebration (2015).
5. We will attempt to increase participation in the American Mathematics Competitions.

One of the recommendations of the Strategic Planning Group for Books made and accepted last August was that the MAA should hire a new acquisitions editor to keep the books pipeline flowing as the irreplaceable Don Albers retires next fall. As was announced in the Governors' Meeting in San Diego, I

will begin in that position (half-time) effective August 1. If you have a book in the works, or just on your mind, get in touch, I'd love to talk to you about it.

We had a report on membership levels, membership is down 16% from 2008. Some of this, no doubt, is a result of the financial downturn, but it is very worrying. Along with increased efforts at member acquisition and retention a drastic simplification of membership dues and membership type options was presented to the Board. We voted to accept this recommendation. You should notice this change in next year's dues statement.

It has been an honor and a privilege to represent this section for the past three years. Thank you and I hope to see you in St. Peter.

I am writing to ask you to think about MAA members who should be on one of our many committees. There are about 130 MAA Committees, offering many opportunities to be involved with MAA; each committee (except the Audit Committee) belongs to one of eight councils. These councils and committees are listed on the MAA website www.maa.org under About Us/Governance/Committees. Terms for most committees are three years and begin January 1; writing award committees have longer terms and some of these, along with AMC committee terms, begin July 1.

To suggest someone for an MAA committee, use the survey monkey form (surveymonkey.com/s/committeesuggestions2013); please give complete information about the person you are recommending. Remember that members of MAA committees must be members of the Association.

A summary of suggestions collected through the survey form are distributed to council chairs the first of April. The Committee on Committees and Councils (which includes all council chairs, president-elect, secretary, and executive director) reviews and discusses committee appointments at the end of April and makes recommendations to the President. Those recommended are asked by e-mail if they will serve; this is usually completed by mid June; those who accept the appointment receive a letter in early October.

North Dakota State University

Sean Sather-Wagstaff was awarded a two year grant "Homological Aspects of Module Theory" through the National Security Agency's Mathematical Science Program. **Josef Dorfmeister** was awarded a five year Collaboration Grant from the Simons Foundation. Dogan Comez was awarded an

EPSCoR start-up grant, funds to continue GraSUS Project activities, and funds for the third-year implementation of the ND-PRIME project.

Assistant Professor **Maria Alfonseca** won the College of Science and Mathematics teaching award. Graduate student **Erin Brownlee** won the College of Science and Mathematics Student Teaching Award. Two graduate students, **Ben Anderson** and **Richard Hasenauer**, were awarded Ph.D. degrees.

The department hired three new faculty on tenure-track positions. **Abraham Ayebo** earned his bachelor's degree from the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology, Ghana in 1996. At the University of Nevada Reno, he earned a master's degree in 2002 and a Ph.D. in 2010 under the supervision of Professor Lynda R. Wiest with the dissertation "Teachers' Perspectives on Teaching Mathematics to Gifted and Talented Students". He held a position as a lecturer at Purdue University Calumet for two years before coming to NDSU. **Indranil SenGupta** joined the faculty as a tenure-track Assistant Professor of Mathematics. He received his Ph.D. from Texas A&M University in 2010. His thesis titled "Analysis of the three-dimensional superradiance problem and some generalizations" was created under the guidance of Professor Goong Chen. He did his postdoctoral work at the University of Texas at El Paso from 2010-2012. **Artem S. Novozhilov** joined the faculty as a tenure-track Assistant Professor of Mathematics. He received his Ph.D. from Moscow State University of Communication Means in 2002 with the dissertation "Mathematical models of interaction between pollutant and environment" under the supervision of Professor Alexander S. Bratus. He did his post-doctoral work at the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Maryland in 2004-2009.
